Boat: A memorable trip by boat from the quay at Strömkajen near the Grand Hotel or Nybroviken in Stockholm. Travel time: appr. 1 hour.

Bus: From Tekniska Högskolan, Valhallavägen in Stockholm. Travel time: appr. 45 mins. SL Tourist pass available.


Car: Route E18 and Road 274. Travel time: appr. 40 mins. Alternative route: via Värmdö and by car ferry from Stenslätten to Oskar Fredriksborg on the island of Rindö to Vaxholm. Travel time: appr. 85 mins.

Distance from the centre of Stockholm to Vaxholm: 35 kilometres.



Vaxholm Fortress

A visit to the fortress is not to be missed. Up until 1944, the fortress was used by the military. It is well maintained, and well worth a visit, as is the splendid Defence Museum, showing how the archipelago's coastal defence system has developed over the last 450 years. A short trip from Vaxholm quayside will get you there.



Waxholm Marina



/axholm is often referred to as the capital of the archipelago, outside Stockholm. Vaxholm consists of 70 islands and has about 11 000 inhabitants. Already in 1548 King Gustav Vasa ordered to build a fortress at the islet and a village started to grow across the strait which in 1647 became a town. The fortress as we know it, was completed in 1863.

Besides the military activities, Vaxholm also had a large fleet of fishingboats. The Baltic herring from Vaxholm, locally named "strömming", is still famous throughout the country. Why not come here and try it for yourself? At the same time you can enjoy the bustling boat life and wander among the beautiful old buildings which are decorated with ornatecarvings. Many of these houses have "glass verandas" where family and friends often gather. Here are some annual events worth noting in your diary- The Archipelago Boat Day, the Archipelago Market with the Herring Rowing Race and the Christmas Market!
